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1. INTRODUCTION

- The Community Development and Policy Studies program focusses on political economy and policy-related courses related to environment, globalization, international relations, and community development. The program has been under-enrolled in recent years– we believe that this is largely due to the name of the program, which is difficult for high school students to understand.
- The Community Development and Policy Studies (CDPS) program faculty members propose to change their program name from “Community Development and Policy Studies” to “Political Science.” There will be no changes to the curriculum. The existing course codes will need to be changed from CDPS to POSC.
- Rationale:
 - 1) The name “Community Development and Policy Studies” is one that is non-traditional and holds little meaning for most high school students entering university. “Political Science” is a more recognizable and meaningful name for our target demographic;
 - 2) “Political Science” is a name that reflects the main components of the existing program: the study of politics and public policy in international and Canadian communities and contexts;
 - 3) The “Political Science” name will assist with program recruitment initiatives by appealing to a broader range of students looking to develop knowledge about, and the skills for employment in, Canadian politics and public service, international and domestic non-profit organizations, and multinational corporations;
 - 4) “Political Science” will provide a more broadly recognizable degree major for those seeking employment in Canadian politics and public service, international and domestic non-profit organizations, and multinational corporations.

Certificate (GASC) Pathway

Students may apply for admission into the second year of the **Community Development and Policy Studies** program upon successful completion of a General Arts and Sciences Certificate – UOIT Liberal Arts Transfer option (GASC). Eligible applicants must have achieved a mark of not less than 70 per cent in each required course in the GASC – UOIT Liberal Arts Transfer courses, with an overall GPA of not less than 3.0 on a 4.3 scale. Admission remains competitive and so is not guaranteed.

15.7.5 Other college certificate pathways

Students who have completed other one-year college programs that are relevant to **Community Development and Policy Studies (CDPS)** may also apply for direct entry into the second year of the **CDPS** program. This opportunity is extended to graduates of one-year college programs with substantial policy, politics, and community development components such as, but not limited to, Community Services and Child Foundations program. This pathway program is designed to attract high-performing college graduates in **CDPS** relevant fields into the **CDPS** program. Eligible students will be expected to have completed each transferable course with a B average (3.3 on a
