Summary of the proposed change

With the clarity provided by the BA degree requirements we have created an opportunity to enable students to pursue a double major for all programs in the BA, with the exception of Liberal Studies. Students would have to complete all course requirements for both majors to be eligible. Depending on the combination of majors it could require students to complete more than 120 credit hours toward their degree.

Description of the ways in which the proposed change will enhance the academic opportunities

Students will have the option to complete two majors over the course of their degree, giving them greater depth of knowledge in an increased number of areas.
