Under Ontario Tech University's Quality Assurance Framework, all degree programs are subject to a comprehensive review every eight years to ensure that they continue to meet provincial quality assurance requirements and to support their ongoing rigour and coherence. Program reviews involve several stages, including:

1. A comprehensive and analytical self-study brief developed by members of the program under review.
2. A site visit by academic experts who are external to and arm's length from the program who prepare a report and recommendations on ways that it may be improved based on a review of the program's self-study and supporting material, and a two day site visit involving discussions with faculty, staff and students and a tour of the facilities.
3. Development of a plan for improvement by the program and proposed timelines for implementation.

All programs that undergo a review must provide a report eighteen months after the completion of the review to gather information on the progress that has been made implementing the agreed upon plans for improvement.

In 2017-2019 a program review was scheduled for the Bachelor of Arts in Political Science, with a site visit on April 25 and 26, 2019. The program has submitted to the Provost's Office a comprehensive chart outlining the progress they have made relative to the action plans resulting from the review. A summary of this progress is provided on the following pages. The summary report is reviewed by the appropriate standing committee of Academic Council, and is subsequently reported to Academic Council and the Board of Governors.

## Next Scheduled Program Review: 2025-2027

### Additional comments:

Over half of the time since the Program Review took place in 2019 has occurred during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Most of the actions accomplished were either initiated or completed prior to the start of the pandemic (in Ontario, as of March 2020) when the Ontario Tech campus closed for in-person interactions. The campus will continue to be closed to all in-person activities, but for very few exceptions, over at least the next semester (Winter 2021). This means that any initiatives will need to be re-imagined for new modes of interacting with students on and off-campus. It is currently unclear what the next academic year will look like and progress on the action items is largely dependent on variables beyond the control of the program
