# **Determining your needs**

## Accessibility and safety

- Consider who else has access to the building/apartment/room.
- Determine your transit needs and locate a home accordingly.
- Ensure the rental unit meets your needs.
- Learn about the security measures that are in place.
- Research the area to find out if it is a safe neighbourhood.

#### Leases

- Always request a copy of all receipts and signed contracts for yourself.
- Ask for clarification if you feel confused or uncertain.
- As of April 30, 2018, landlords in Ontario are required to use a Standard Form of Lease. The Government of Ontario offers a <u>guide for newcomers</u> that is available in multiple languages.
- Consider how long the lease agreement is. For example, if you don't like the location, shorter leases make it easier to move out and find other accommodations.
- Determine the move-in date and if there is a lease end date or move-out date.
- Learn whether the accommodations are fully furnished, partially furnished, or unfurnished. If you do not have access to collect furniture, consider a fully furnished rental.
- Read and understand every term and condition before signing the lease.

#### **Rental Amenities**

- · Ask about the average cost of utilities if they are not included in the rent.
- Be prepared to pay a deposit of last month's rent upfront as this is common with rentals. Note: Deposits cannot equal more than one month's rent.
- Check how far the rental unit is from the school and other amenities.
- Consider if you would like roommates or prefer living alone.
- Learn about tenant access to communal areas (kitchen, bathroom, living room).
- Make sure that the cost of rent and other living expenses is within your budget.
- Think about costs that are in addition to the rent such as utilities and laundry.





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
