RESEARCH ACHIEVEMENTS & ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Current & Future Research Interests

My research examines the lived experiences of immigrant and racialized communities, with particular attention to the intersections of immigration, race, gender, sexuality, and structural violence. I focus on how social institutions such as family, law, education, healthcare, and policing shape inequalities and influence the well-being of marginalized populations. My work addresses issues including intimate partner violence, elder abuse, Islamophobia, human trafficking, and mental health, with a particular emphasis on South Asian communities in Canada. A central theme in my research is the study of intergenerational dynamics within immigrant families and the ways younger generations negotiate identity, gender roles, sexuality, and belonging while navigating tensions between cultural traditions and broader social norms. I also examine gendered power relations within institutions, including academia, and broader questions related to quality of life among racialized communities. My research is grounded in an intersectional and interdisciplinary framework drawing from sociology, criminology, migration studies, and gender studies. Using both qualitative and quantitative approaches, including interviews, mixed methods research, community partnerships, and statistical analysis, my work seeks to capture the complex realities of marginalized populations and contribute to policy and community-based responses to social inequality. More recently, my research has expanded to examine the role of digital technologies and communication platforms in shaping identity, intimacy, and community formation among immigrant and LGBTQIA+ youth, as well as issues such as elder abuse, sexual health, and interactions between racialized communities and policing institutions. Overall, my scholarship aims to deepen understanding of systemic inequalities while informing policy, community interventions, and broader conversations on equity and social justice in Canada.
